Course 2: Road Trip in Gifu

① Gifu Castle || 岐阜城



Gifu Castle, perched on Mount Kinka, offers stunning views, a museum, and ties to Oda Nobunaga. It's especially beautiful in winter with snow, and during cherry blossom and autumn seasons, the surrounding landscape adds to its charm.

② Kawaramachi ||川原町



Kawatamachi is a historic district in Gifu City, located along the Nagara River. Known for its traditional Edo-period architecture, charming streets, and picturesque views, it offers a glimpse into the past. Famous for its handmade Gifu lanterns, it's a perfect spot to stroll, shop, and experience local culture.

On the second day, you'll visit Seki and Mino by rental car. In Seki, explore the famous knife-making traditions and the Cutlery Museum. Then, head to Mino to experience the craft of Mino Washi and enjoy the region's beautiful scenery and historical charm.

1 Seki || 関

① Gujo Hachiman || 郡上八幡

① Nakatsugawa & Magome || 中津川と馬籠

② Ena Iwamura ||恵那岩村

① Tajimi|| 多治見
